Closing the research gap/practise gap: The impact of knowledge brokerage on an Occupational Therapy Department

Commencing in July 2013, the Occupational Therapy department at Barwon Health has partnered with the Occupational Science and Therapy department at Deakin University around evidence based practice and building capacity for knowledge translation thru a knowledge brokerage model. KEY PEFORMANCE INDICATORS

- Investigations undertaken in both clinical areas and professional development (i.e. practice education)
- Participation in the steering group which has developed the Translating Allied Health Knowledge (TAHK) framework
